OUR MISSION

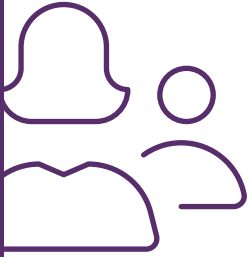
Alternatives to Violence provides shelter, advocacy, education and resources for people impacted by domestic violence, sexual assault and human trafficking.

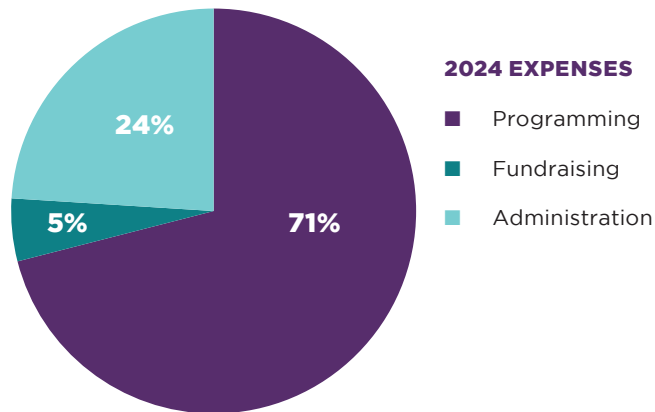
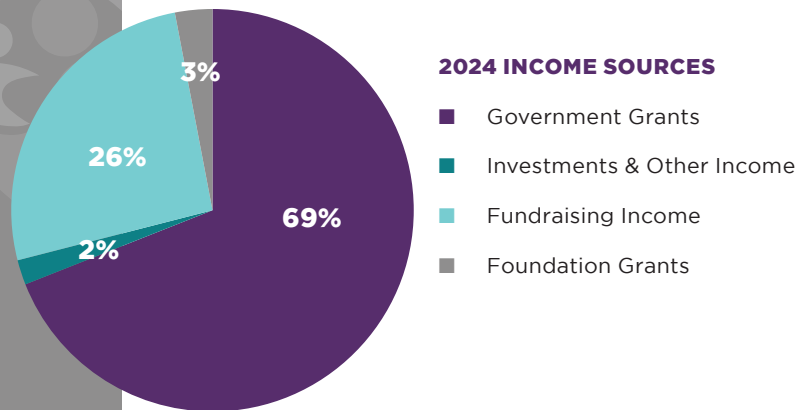

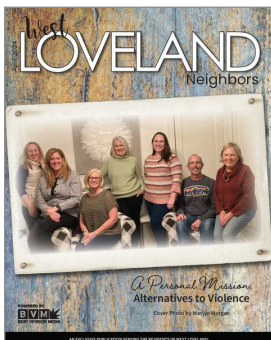

FINDING SAFETY AND STRENGTH WITH ALTERNATIVES TO VIOLENCE



Melissa* has been working closely with ATV for the past few years. She has engaged with staff regularly to safety plan around living with her abusive husband. For years he had financially, physically, and verbally abused her. It was not a safe option to file for divorce while still living together, so finding new housing was priority number one. Finally, with the help of ATV's Housing Team, after years of applying to various different programs Melissa finally was accepted into a long-term housing program where she can be on her own and safe from her abusive husband. With the help of Melissa's support system, and

ATV's valuable partnership with Two Men and a Truck, she was able to have everything moved out in a safe and quick manner. This is the fresh start she has been dreaming of for years. Melissa is still working with ATV for support while navigating her divorce process, but she is feeling much less stressed in her own safe living environment.

All of this would not have been available to Melissa if we didn't have your support! Donations keep our services accessible to those who need them.
