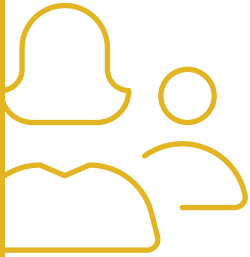

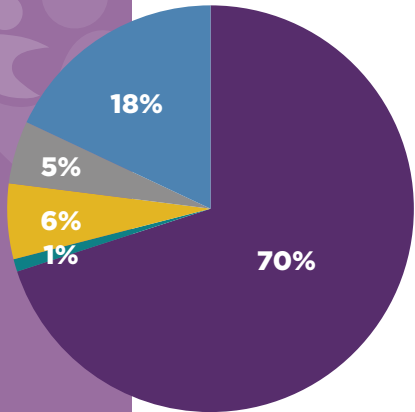

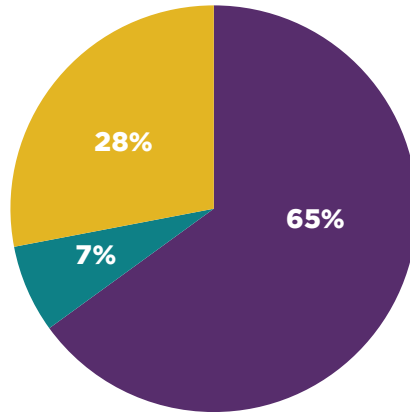

2025 HIGHLIGHTS



In 2025, Alternatives to Violence hosted its most highly attended Purple Ribbon Breakfast to date. The event was strengthened by the powerful presence of featured speakers Nichole and Jim Schmidt, the mother and stepfather of Gabby Petito, whose story had recently premiered as a Netflix documentary.



Remodeling of the safehouse was completed in March 2025. The remodel, done by DS Constructors, included a new security door, the addition of a staff bathroom and the expansion of 9 to 12 bedrooms, allowing us to accommodate 32 (from 23) beds. That's a 40% capacity increase!



Alternatives to Violence hosted an “Evening of Gratitude” to personally express our heartfelt thanks to our wonderful donors and sponsors. The event took place in July at the High Country Beverage hospitality room.



Alternatives to Violence was grateful to be included in NOCO Style's September issue in the article “When Love Hurts,” which centered on how to identify abuse in romantic relationships. Our Program Manager, Jillian Kolman, lent her expertise to the article, helping to educate and empower the Northern Colorado community.

FINDING HOPE AND HEALING WITH ALTERNATIVES TO VIOLENCE



Jerry* came into the safehouse program escaping domestic violence by an intimate partner. While in the program, he was able to file for and was granted a temporary protection order against his abuser. He was able to get a lawyer to represent him in the divorce and protection order cases. He worked with CPS and was able to obtain full custody of his children and bring them to the shelter. While in the shelter program, Jerry maintained his full-time job, enrolled some of

the children in therapy services, and made sure their medical needs were met. Legal fees, childcare, mortgage payments, and other expenses made it difficult for Jerry to keep up with his car payment. Thanks to Realities for Children and Hand-to-Hand, ATV was able to cover Jerry's and his teenage son's car payments for the next month so they could continue getting to work, school and appointments.
